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I. PURPOSE

To provide basic guidelines and policy for emergency medical operations at a multiple casualty or patient incident.

II. CONCEPT OF OPERATIONS

Regardless of size or complexity, Iowa County and its communities will utilize the processes, protocols, and procedures established through the National Incident Management System (NIMS). NIMS standardizes incident management for all hazards across all levels of government through the use of the Incident Command System (ICS). This plan meets requirements outlined in ICS 420, Chapter 20 "Multi-Casualty" (2004).

III. RESPONSIBILITY

It will be the responsibility of each member to exercise the appropriate control dictated by their role in the implementation of these guidelines.

IV. DEFINITIONS

A. Area Hospitals-

- 1. University of Iowa (Level 1 Trauma, Burns, Pediatric, Neonate & Hyperbaric Oxygen Chamber)
- 2. Mercy Iowa City (Level 3 Trauma)
- 3. Marengo Memorial Hospital (Level 4 Trauma)
- 4. Mercy Cedar Rapids (Level 2 Trauma, Pediatrics & Neonate)
- 5. St. Luke's Cedar Rapids (Level 2 Trauma, Pediatrics & Neonate)
- 6. VA Hospital Iowa City (Level 3 Trauma)
- 7. Grinnell Regional Medical Center (Level 3 Trauma)
- 8. Keokuk County Health Center (Level 4 Trauma)

B. Ground Ambulance Coordinator

1. Reports to the Patient Transportation Unit Leader, manages the Ambulance Staging Area and dispatches ambulances as requested.

C. Mass Casualty Incident

1. Incidents resulting from man-made or natural causes resulting in illness or injuries that exceed or overwhelm the EMS and hospital capabilities of a locality, jurisdiction, area, or region. A mass casualty incident is likely to impose a sustained demand for health and medical services.

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D. MCI Declaration

1. Communication from Incident Commander to hospitals and Dispatch alerting them to an actual MCI. The alert will include the total number of patients and should occur as soon as the information is provided from field units.

E. MCI Potential Notification

1. Communication from Incident Commander or Dispatch to hospitals alerting them to the <u>potential</u> for an MCI. The notification will include the total number of potential patients and should occur as soon as the information is provided from field units.

F. Medical Branch Director (highest position) (oversees divisions & group leaders)

1. During a mass casualty incident, the Incident Commander, through the Operations Section Chief, may appoint a Medical Branch Director to oversee and coordinate all on scene EMS activities.

G. Medical Division Supervisor(s) (second highest position)

1. On incidents with concentrations of patients in multiple geographic areas, the Medical Branch Director may choose to divide operations geographically and appoint a Medical Division Supervisor(s) over each geographic area. Each Division will operate independent of each other and coordinate activities through the Medical Branch Director.

H. Medical Communications Leader

1. Reports to the Patient Transportation Unit Leader, responsible for communicating and tracking hospital availability between the Medical Group Leader and Patient Transportation Unit Leader.

I. Medical Group Leader (third highest, but most commonly filled position)

1. Reports to Medical Branch Director or Division Supervisor when filled. The Medical Group Leader oversees Triage Unit, Treatment Unit and Transportation Unit. For larger geographic incidents that require more units, additional Medical Group Leaders can be added along with a Medical Division Supervisor(s). For the purpose of this plan, Medical Group Leader is used most commonly as the lead position.

J. Morgue Manager

1. Reports to the Triage Unit Leader and assumes responsibilities for all morgue area functions (normally assigned to personnel from Medical Examiner's office).

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K. Multi-Patient Incident

- 1. Multi-Patient incidents are incidents involving multiple victims that can be managed, with heightened response (including mutual aid), by a single agency or system. Multi-patient incidents typically do not overwhelm the hospital capabilities of a jurisdiction and/or region, but may exceed the capabilities for one or more hospitals within a locality. There is usually a short, intense peak demand for health and medical services.
- 2. Multi-Casualty incidents are incidents involving multiple victims that Overwhelms the local system(s) and requires a more regional approach.
- 3. Each agency should follow their department policy for defining an MCI within their jurisdiction. As a general rule, incidents involving three (3) or more "red" patients (trauma or medical) or a total patient count of six (6) or more at one location may be identified as a MCI. A MABAS Alarm level 3 begins most MCI events. It is the responsibility of each hospital to determine their internal response to an MCI declaration and to activate its own internal plan(s).

L. Transport Group Supervisor (Patients)

- 1. Reports to the Medical Group Leader and supervises the Medical Communications Coordinator. Responsible for the coordination of Patient Transport and maintenance of records relating to the patients' identification, condition, and destination.
- M. Primary Dispatch Center = "Iowa County" Communications Center
 - 1. The dispatch center responsible for dispatching agencies within the jurisdiction where the MCI incident is taking place.

N. START and JumpSTART Triage

The system utilized as a standard in the State of Iowa and Iowa County for sorting of injuries or illnesses to determine priorities of treatment and transportation in order to maximize the number of survivors. Details and procedures are included in the Operations portion of this document.

Red = Immediate

Yellow = Delayed

Green = Walking Wounded / Minor

Black = Deceased

O. Trauma Center

- 1. Hospitals with a level 1 or level 2 Trauma designation.
- 2. a) UIHC is a Level 1 Trauma
 - b) Mercy & St. Luke's Cedar Rapids are Level 2 Trauma

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P. Treatment Area Managers (Red/Yellow/Green)

1. Report to the Treatment Unit Leader who is responsible for coordinating with the Patient Transport Unit Leader for the movement of patients from the Treatment areas to the Transportation loading area and resources.

Q. Treatment Unit Leader

1. Reports to the Medical Group Leader and supervises Treatment Area Managers. Assumes responsibility for the treatment, preparation for transport, directs the movement of patients to the loading location.

R. Triage Unit Leader

1. Reports to the Medical Group Leader and supervises the process of completing the Triage Process and the transfer of patients to the treatment area or to the morgue.

V. COMMUNICATIONS

- A. If the Primary Dispatch Center (Iowa County) has not identified the potential of an MCI from the 911 calls, field units should promptly communicate with the Primary Dispatch Center (Iowa County) when the potential for an MCI exists and include the estimated number of patients. The Primary Dispatch Center (Iowa County) should initiate an MCI potential notification that includes the number of potential patients by contacting all area hospitals and trauma centers. The Primary Dispatch Center (Iowa County) should also notify Iowa County Emergency Management.
- B. If a MCI criterion is confirmed by the incident commander or initial arriving emergency responder, an MCI declaration should be made by contacting the Primary Dispatch Center (Iowa County). If the incident does not meet criteria, the MCI potential notification should be cancelled.
- C. The following information should be provided when an MCI declaration is made:
 - 1. Nature of the incident and exact location
 - 2. Approximate number of patients and severity of injuries.
 - 3. As triage is completed and transportation is determined, the Transportation Officer should notify Iowa County with the number of Red, Yellow, and Green patients each hospital shall receive.
 - 4. The senior most Paramedic on scene will assume **Medical Group Leader** and will provide initial communications to the hospitals for an initial report.
 - 5. Identify and communicate where the staging area will be established.

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D. MCI Response Levels & MABAS Box Alarm Cards for EMS

1. The following response levels are based on a standard patient to transport unit ratio. They are intended as <u>guidelines</u> for reasonably needed basic resources based on the number of patients. The Medical Group Leader, at their discretion, may request additional or specialized equipment.

MABAS Alarm Level 3 is a MCI Level 1 (6-10 victims)

- Additional Ground Ambulances per the MABAS Box Card for the area of the incident.
- Third and Fourth units paged using IamResponding or WENS systems.
- Closest QRS team is requested. Additional QRS teams may be requested.
- 1 Helicopter Launched and more on standby
- Iowa County to notify Marengo Memorial Hospital and UIHC Trauma Center.
- Medical Group Leader & Triage ICS filled.

MABAS Alarm Level 4 is a MCI Level 2 (11-15 victims)

- Additional Ground Ambulances per the MABAS Box Card for the area of the incident.
- Additional Helicopters Launch and more on standby.
- 3 closest QRS teams paged.
- Iowa County to notify the 4 closest hospitals to the scene and UIHC Trauma Center.
- Medical Group Leader, Triage, Transport & Treatment ICS filled.
- Consider Bus or Para-transit vans to the scene for minor patients.

MABAS Alarm Level 5 is a MCI Level 3 (16 or more victims)

- Additional Ground Ambulances per the MABAS Box Card for the area of the incident.
- Notify all Iowa County Ambulance Personnel to report to work using IamResponding or WENS systems.
- All QRS teams paged.
- Iowa County to notify the 4 closest hospitals to the scene and UIHC Trauma Center.
- Remaining ICS positions needed are filled as needed under Medical Branch.
- Consider request for MASS CASUALTY TRAILERS to the scene.
- 1. MABAS Box Alarm Cards will include all resources in the previous Alarms plus resources in the requested Box Alarm. Normal Iowa County Operations are at an alarm level one and two (1) & (2).
- 2. Iowa County MCI alarms levels are three through five (3), (4), & (5).

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VI. OPERATIONS

A. Incident Command System (ICS)

- 1. **Medical Group Leader**
 - a. The on-site EMS provider with the highest certification, seniority, and authority will be the Medical Group Leader until relieved by a senior officer. The Medical Group Leader should be an experienced person with strong ICS, EMS, and scene management skills.
 - b. The Medical Group Leader will make a rapid assessment of the incident.
 - i. Using established protocols listed in Section IV.A, identify and declare a MCI through the primary dispatch center.
 - ii. Determine approximate number of patients and severity of injuries. This report will be continually updated as the incident progresses.
 - iii. Determine if multiple Medical Divisions will be required and establish their locations/boundaries.
 - iv. Request additional medical personnel, supplies, equipment, and vehicles.
 - c. Designate areas for and assign personnel to the positions of:
 - i. **Triage** Unit Leader
 - ii. Treatment Unit Leader
 - iii. Transportation Group Supervisor
 - iv. **Staging** (Ground Ambulances)
 - v. Medical Division Supervisors (if required)
 - vi. **Medical Branch Director** (if required)
 - vii. Additional ICS positions (if required)
 - d. The Medical Group Leader will manage on scene EMS operations and report to the Division or Branch position if and / or, when filled.
 - e. Rotate workers (depending on elements, job stress, etc.) out of the area for "rehab". Length of work period and rehabilitation period will be determined by the Medical Group Leader based on nature of situation and available personnel to maximize effective use of responders.
 - f. Assure transfer of patients by priority to treatment unit (ensure sufficient litter teams are available).
 - g. Assure Ambulance staging location and request additional radio channels as needed.

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2. Triage Unit Leader, "Triage"

- a. The Triage Unit Leader will obtain a briefing from the Medical Group Leader.
- b. The Triage Unit Leader will determine equipment and personnel needs of triage unit, and request from Medical Group Leader.
- c. Coordinates personnel assigned to triage branch.
- d. Ascertain from EMS Group Leader if it is safe to begin triage.
- e. All Casualties should be moved from the immediate incident site to a Treatment Area, which will be established in a "safe" area and, if possible, protected from the elements. In this collecting point, arriving casualties will be evaluated and organized by category (patients may need to be re-tagged).
- f. Evaluation and re-evaluation of patient condition and continued triaging in the following categories:

Adult START Triage:

Adult Start Triage S.O.P. will be followed.

Pediatric JumpStart Triage:

Pediatric Jump START Triage S.O.P. will be followed.

3. Treatment Unit Leader, "Treatment"

- a. The Treatment Unit Leader will obtain a briefing from the Medical Group Leader.
- b. The Treatment Unit Leader will determine equipment and personnel needs of treatment unit, and request from Medical Group Leader and Coordinates personnel assigned to triage unit.
- c. The Treatment Unit Leader will establish a Primary Treatment Area
 - i. Must be capable of accommodating large number of patients and equipment
 - ii. Divide area into three (3) distinct area using colored tarps and cones.
 - iii. Consider: weather, safety, hazards, and potential need for shelter
 - iv. Area must be readily accessible for ease of flow patterns.
 - v. Designate entrance and exit points to area
- d. The Treatment Unit Leader will designate a Secondary Treatment Area as an alternate should the primary area become unusable. Inform the Medical Group Leader of primary and secondary treatment locations.

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- e. As a guideline, assign personnel to treatment areas based on EMS certifications (example):
 - i. Paramedics = Immediate
 - ii. Advanced EMT's = Delayed
 - iii. Emergency Medical Responders = Minor
- f. Re-triage patients upon arrival at treatment area, place patients in appropriate sections.
- g. Complete Treatment Unit Log as patients pass through treatment area.
- h. The Treatment Dispatch Manager (if appointed) will coordinate with Patient Transportation Unit Leader when patients have been prepared for transport; evacuate patients by priority.
- i. Begin relieving or reducing staff as necessary and regularly inventory supplies/order as needed.
- j. The Treatment Unit Leader will report to Medical Group Leader for reassignment upon completion of tasks.

4. **Patient Transportation Unit Leader**, "*Transport*"

- a. The Patient Transportation Unit Leader will obtain a briefing from the Medical Group Leader.
- b. The Patient Transportation Unit Leader will determine equipment and personnel needs of transportation unit, and request from Medical Group Leader.
- c. General duties for the Transportation Unit Leader include:
 - i. Provide and coordinate patient transport
 - ii. Fill out and maintain Patient Tally Sheet, including name and destination
 - iii. Direct departing ambulances to hospitals based on capabilities and provide periodic updates to the Medical Group Leader and/or the primary communications center.
 - iv. Coordinate routing of Patients to proper ambulances and complete Unit Log Sheet.
- d. The Patient Transportation Unit Leader is responsible for tracking the destination of each red patient utilizing the trauma/triage tag and (whenever possible) the patient's name or basic description
- e. The Patient Transportation Unit Leader will consult with the Treatment Unit Leader and establish patient loading zone. *(zone should have separate entrance and exit routes)
- f. The Patient Transportation Unit Leader will advise the Medical Group Leader of loading zone locations, air medical landing zones, and best route for access.
- g. The Medical Communications Coordinator (if appointed) will maintain communications with Medical Group Leader, receiving updates on hospital availability and working with the Patient Transport Unit Leader in coordinating the destination for patients.

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- h. The Patient Transportation Unit Leader will request ambulances from the Staging as needed.
- i. The Patient Transportation Unit Leader will advise the Medical Group Leader when the last patient is transported.
- j. The Transportation Unit Leader will divide transport destinations of each category of patients based on the following guidelines:
- k. **The Patient Transportation Unit Leader** should request mass transportation from the IC for the removal of all uninjured patients as quickly as possible.
 - i. This group should be transported off-site to a local collection point (a fire or police station) where they can continue to be monitored and then released.
 - ii. Prior to boarding to depart the scene, EMS should confirm again the absence of any signs/symptoms. EMS presence should be continued until all uninjured patients have been released.

5. Ground Ambulance Coordinator, "Staging"

- a. In order to prevent unnecessary congestion and confusion at the site, a staging area will be will established for all incoming equipment and personnel. The Ground Ambulance Coordinator:
 - i. Will obtain a briefing from the Medical Group Leader.
 - ii. Will determine best organizational layout for staging area (keep staged units away from actual incident).
 - iii. Inventories, by logging, all arriving vehicles and personnel's level of care. (The log sheet should be filled out by one or two individuals to simplify follow-up interpretations.)
 - iv. Directs parking in such a manner that allows for the response of any vehicle. (If possible, set up parking so vehicles do not require backing.)
 - v. Works directly with the Medical Group Leader to request sufficient resources for staging and requests additional MABAS Box Alarms as needed.
 - vi. Checks in all unassigned apparatus. Reports to Medical Group Leader of available resources in staging. The Ground Ambulance Coordinator will shuttle incoming supplies on to the next vehicle heading towards the Treatment Area. (This minimizes vehicle traffic, but moves the necessary equipment to the equipment pool.)
 - vii. Requests maintenance and fuel as needed, and if not handled by the Logistics Section.

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viii. Responds immediately to request for resources and direct the movement of vehicles.

B. SECURITY

1. The most accessible on-site Law Enforcement Officer will be requested to initiate activity to establish a security perimeter to prevent unauthorized entry and interference with the on-site operations.

C. POST EVENT CONSIDERATIONS

- 1. Upon termination of the event, all participating agencies will be responsible for collection of equipment at the scene and at hospitals.
- 2. Each agency shall follow protocol regarding post-event counseling for responders.
- 3. Participate in an after action report and debriefing hot wash.

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MABAS BOX ALARMS for Iowa County

1. Purpose:

- A. The purpose of MABAS Box Alarm is to have a pre-arranged list of regional ambulances immediately available for mutual aid responses to local cities, counties, NDMS, or hospitals in the event of an MCI or evacuation.
- B. Each MABAS Alarm serves to request resources closest to the incident while maintain coverage in all areas of the county.

2. Authority:

- A. Pre-determined MABAS Box Alarms do not constitute a formal agreement, but rather will be looked upon as general guidelines that can be utilized when necessary by any EMS service or hospital to rapidly respond to a request for a large number of ambulances while not depleting a geographical area from routine ambulance response and coverage.
- B. These guidelines are consistent with the ems contingency agreements in place with Iowa County Ambulance.

3. Assumptions:

- A. This policy may be used for responses to areas outside of Iowa County or for NDMS transports or emergency Hospital evacuations.
- B. If the requesting agency does not already have a predetermined MABAS Box Alarm Cards, the closest jurisdiction to the requesting agency should be used.
- C. It can also be used within Iowa County for MCI incidents, understanding that some of the ambulances on the MABAS Box Alarm Cards may already be committed to the incident or other incidents occurring at the same time.
- D. MABAS BOX Alarm Cards are set up in a manner to not duplicate resources from initial dispatch through the MCI levels (1 & 2).
- E. Each agency has declared the number of resources they are able to dedicate to an MCI incident and only those resources should be included on the MABAS Box Alarm Cards.
- F. It is assumed that other incidents may be underway that are already using assets assigned to the MABAS Box Alarm Cards, or that assets might be down for maintenance and other various reasons making them unavailable.
- G. Every attempt was made to spread the drawdown of resources from the agency to agency.
- H. Iowa County Transportation or local school buses can be used to transport green/minor injuries if accompanied by a medical provider with appropriate ems equipment with them.

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4. General:

- A. The MABAS Box Alarm Cards has been developed with a systematic approach to resource management.
- B. No agency is bound or committed to respond with the MABAS BOX Alarm. If your agency is requested, it will be up to your supervisor to make the decision on response based on availability at the time of the incident.
- C. The MABAS Box Alarm Cards are provided to Iowa County Dispatch.
- D. Iowa County Dispatch centers will work through the MABAS Box Alarm until required numbers of ambulance have been assigned to the incident.
- E. Iowa County's normal responses are a MABAS alarm 1 & 2.
- F. MCI responses are MABAS alarm 3, 4, and 5.
- G. Iowa County has 9 MABAS Boxes with alarm levels 1 through 5.
- H. Iowa County MABAS BOXES are an attachment to this plan.

I. Red patients

- A. The total number of red patients will be divided equally between hospitals that can accept trauma patients. An attempt to split the pediatric patients evenly between hospitals should be done if possible.
- B. All red patients are to be transported directly to a trauma center, unless the geographic location dictates that the patient should be taken to the nearest facility.
- C. Preferably, red patients should be transported solely (one patient per transport unit) and should be under the care of at least one paramedic.
- D. The Patient Transportation Unit Leader will notify the Medical Group Leader of the total number of red patients that each facility will be receiving. This information will be relayed to receiving hospitals by phone or radio.

II. Yellow Patients

- A. The total number of yellow patients will be divided equally among the area hospitals, with the most severe/potentially unstable being transported to the closest facilities first and the least severe/stable being transported to farther facilities next. An attempt to split the pediatric patients evenly between hospitals should be done if possible.
- B. The first yellow patients leaving the scene should be transported to hospitals other than the trauma centers that received red patients. This will give those facilities time to recover and prepare for the yellow patients.
- C. The Patient Transportation Unit Leader will notify the Medical Group Leader of the total number of yellow patients each facility will be receiving. This information will be relayed to receiving hospitals by phone or radio.
- D. Yellow patients should be transported solely (one patient per transport unit) if severe or potentially unstable and should be under the care of at least one paramedic. If the yellow patient is less severe/stable, a green patient may also be transported at the same time.

III. Green Patients


- A. The total number of green patients will be divided equally among all hospitals, including trauma centers. There is no set order for transport; however, consider transporting a greater number of green patients to the closest local facility without overloading since most of these patients will be seen and released with minimal time in the ER. Depending on location, consider transporting some of these patients to area hospitals. Unless required due to acuity, parents and children should be transported to the same facility if possible.
- B. The Patient Transportation Unit Leader will notify the Medical Group Leader of the total number of green patients each facility will be receiving. This information will be relayed to receiving hospitals by phone or radio.
- C. Green patients may be transported several at a time, provided adequate BLS staff is available for each transport.



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

Each box alarm requested also includes the resources in the previous box alarms. Normal lowa County Operations are at an alarm level one and two (1) & (2). Iowa County MCI alarms levels are three through five (3), (4), & (5).

1st Alarm: Report from dispatch of up to 2 patients. Requires 1 ambulance.

2nd **Alarm:** Report from dispatch or emergency responders of 3 to 5 patients. The situation may require at least 2 additional ambulances and/or a flight service.

<u>3rd Alarm:</u> Report from dispatch or emergency responders of 6 to 10 patients. The situation may require 3 additional ground units and/or an additional flight service.

4th Alarm: Report from dispatch or emergency responders of 11 to 15 patients. The situation may require 4 additional ground units.

<u>5th Alarm:</u> Report from dispatch or emergency responders of 16 or more patients. The situation may require at least 5 additional ambulances as well as additional resources.
